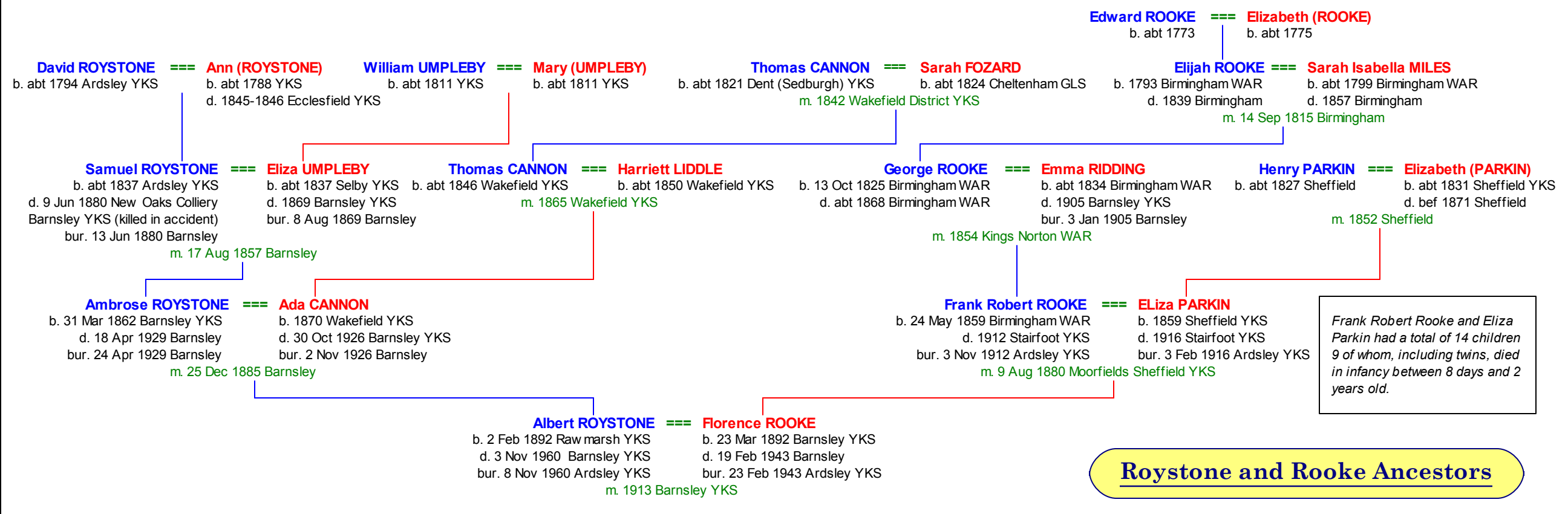
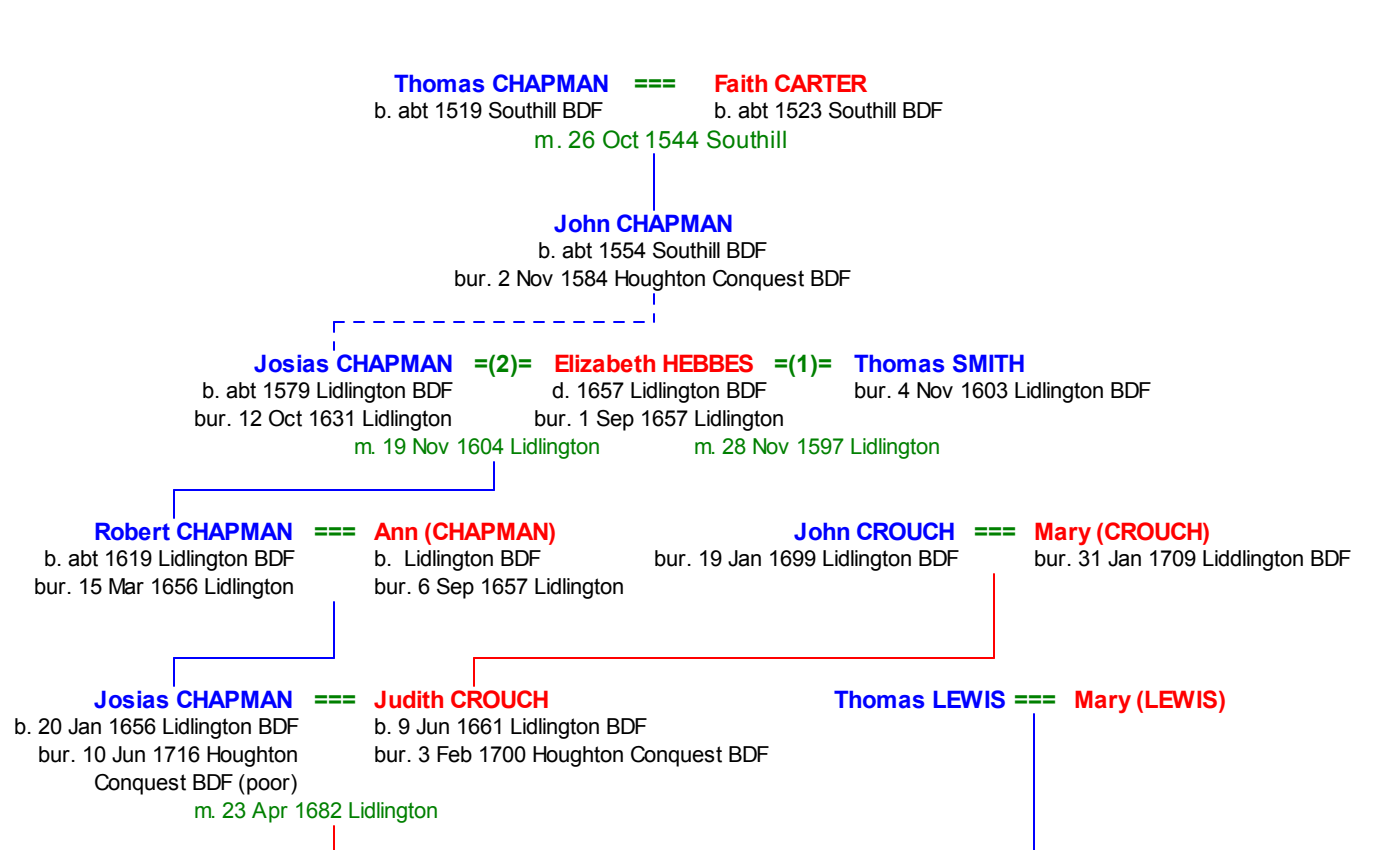
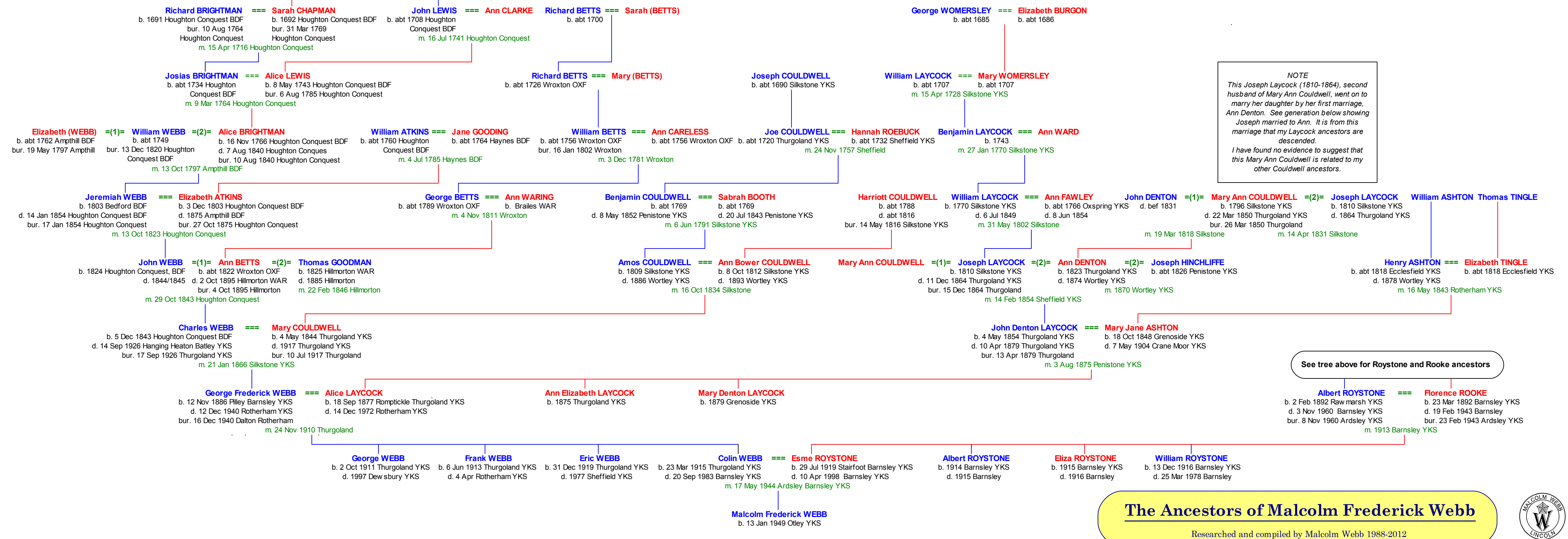


- NOTES**
- Female birth names have been maintained throughout my research. Where a female birth name is unknown, the husband's surname is used in brackets e.g. Ann (CHAPMAN).
  - The links to the two Chapman generations beyond Josias Chapman (1579-1631) who married Elizabeth Hebbes in 1604 are not fully proved. The information was given to me by a fellow researcher but I am unable to prove to my satisfaction that John Chapman (1554-1584) born in Southill and buried in Houghton Conquest was the father of Josias Chapman born in Lidlington, although it is a reasonable assumption from all the evidence available.
  - Josias Chapman (1656-1716) who died "poore" according to the Bishop's Transcripts was left an inheritance at the age of 10 in the will of his father's brother, John Chapman who died in 1667. In 1687 a Josias Chapman was described as "Overseer of the Poor" in notes in the burial register of Lidlington.
  - There is no record of a marriage between William Webb (1749-1820) and his first wife Elizabeth. There appears to be a complete marriage register missing for Ampthill.
  - The date of death of John webb (1824-1844/45) is assumed from his widow remarrying in 1846. I have not been able to locate a record of his death or a death certificate.
